








Tips from a local

Not only is **NICK GORSKI**, Valet at The Hythe Hotel, a longtime employee, but he's a native to Vail and knows the mountain like the back of his hand. According to Groski, "the options for adventure in Vail in the Summer are guite extensive."

- * "Vail is perfect because of the sheer range of activities people can enjoy. The weather is beautiful and you can experience a new adventure daily. Plus, there's no place like Vail on a warm evening, beside a fire, making S'mores. Nothing says Summer more than that."
- Some of Groski's favorite things to do are rafting the Colorado River and exploring the stops along the way. He goes on to say, "of course, there is no better way to enjoy the famed bluebird skies than during a round of golf. My personal favorite is Red Sky." While Red Sky is technically located in nearby Wolcott (roughly a 20-minute drive from Vail), Gorski says, "it's worth it."
- But if you would rather keep your adventures closer to Vail, "guests of The Hythe can walk right out of the front door to hit the Berry Picker Trail for a day of hiking." His favorite insider tip he shares with guests is, "if you're tired from the climb up, enjoy the views and rest your legs by taking the gondola back down-it's a free ride!"





1. Colorado Snowsports Museum

While you can't ski in the Summer, you can learn about the history of skiing (and other Winter sports) in Vail at the Colorado Snowsports Museum. Plus, they offer a historic Vail Village walking tour. Admission to the museum is free but donations are accepted. snowsportsmuseum.org

2. BRAVO! Vail

In its 35th season this Summer, BRAVO! Vail Music Festival will showcase some of the world's greatest orchestras at the Ford Amphitheater. Enjoy the soulful sounds of the classics, jazz and more with 60 concerts over six weeks. June 23-August 4. bravovail.org

3. Betty Ford Alpine Gardens

4. Hiking

IVANNA GORLA, Lodge Manager at Scarp Ridge Lodge says, "the high-altitude paradise (Crested Butte) has become a world-class destination for outdoor adventure, art and artisan crafts. Designated an official Colorado Creative District, Crested Butte is also home to one of the nation's top iuried art festivals which shuts down Elk Avenue on the first weekend in August every year."

- For those outdoorsy people looking to hit the beautiful mountain trails, Gorla says, "Crested Butte boasts the largest single-track mountain biking trail system in the US. Take the mountain bike trail 401 for wildflowers, aspens and endless views."
- Some of her "mustdo's" in Crested Butte include a stop by the Public House for the town's favorite beer from the Irwin Brewing Company, live music, and great food. Or grab a pizza, some 'crack fries' and a game of pool at Secret Stash. Be sure to visit Montanya's Distillery (female-founded and female-owned) for a posh island rum cocktail mixed with the distillery's very own rum. They are generous with their drink recipes so grab a bottle to bring home and mix up the exact same mountain cocktails long after your trip.







1. Mountain biking

Begin with the classic beginner route "Lower Loop" near Peanut Lake or ramp up your trail cred with the classic intermediate "Lupine." Be sure to also check out the ski hill where you can ride the lifts and bike down. travelcrestedbutte.com

2. Wildflowers

Named the "wildflower capital of Colorado," Crested Butte explodes with color mid-Summer. Celebrate this colorful time of year with the annual Wildflower Festival, July 8-11. Stop and see the flowers throughout town, along the roadside and on one of the many hiking or biking trails. Don't forget to bring your camera to capture the breathtaking views.

3. Historic downtown

Downtown Crested Butte is the eighth largest Colorado National Historic Landmark District. Take a historic walking tour along Elk Avenue to view the well-preserved original historic buildings, saloons and homes. travelcrestedbutte.com

4. Crested Butte Arts Festival

In its 50th year this Summer, the Crested Butte Arts Festival

will feature over 100 fine artists and vendors from August 5-7 downtown. The event is great for the whole family with lots of food options, craft stations and face painting for kids. crestedbutteartsfestival.com

"I couldn't resist getting back to Fort Collins. I missed the quick access to the mountains, the 'small town' community feeling and, of course, Horsetooth!" says Stine.

"newest" additions to Fort Collins is the Poudre River White Water Park. Stine describes it as a "fun local spot to walk or bike around. You can always find a kayaker attempting to conquer the rapids, people floating in the Summer and dogs everywhere!"

"Horsetooth Reservoir is definitely a must-see," she says. "Whether you are hiking to the top, mountain biking the trails around the reservoir or paddle boarding on the water it's something you can't miss especially in the Summer. The Poudre River Trail should also be on top of the to-do list. With over 20 miles there are so many areas to explore."



Where to explore

1. Horsetooth Reservoir

The 6.5-mile reservoir is THE spot for outdoor recreation in Fort Collins. Enjoy fishing, stand-up paddle-boarding, sailing, boating and swimming. Also, take a hike to Horsetooth Falls for some more Summer fun. **visitftcollins**.

2. Visit a brewery

Home to the Fat Tire Brewing Company, the town of Fort Collins is synonymous with Colorado's craft brewery scene. With 20-plus breweries, it's not hard to find a cold beer after your long hike. **visitftcollins.com**

3. Live at "The Mish"

Catch a live show at the iconic Mishawaka Amphitheatre, referred to as "The Mish" by locals. Centered in the Poudre Canyon along the river, the venue is the host to a variety of musical talents.

Great Sand Dunes National Park

* The tallest dunes in North America are the main attraction at the Great Sand Dunes National Park. Resting in the shadows of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains in the San Luis Valley, incredible views can be seen while shredding the gnar or hiking amongst the dunes. This Summer, spend a day at the beach at Medano Creek or camp under the stars any time of year at the incredible International Dark Sky Park. nps.gov

Roxborough State Park

Resting in Denver's backyard, just 35 miles south, Roxborough State Park is the crown jewel of the Front Range. Its distinctive red rock formations are the centerpiece of this nearly 400-acre park. Explore eight different trails (totaling 14 miles) designed for hiking, wildlife viewing and bird watching. Plus, the trail system also connects to Douglas County Open Space Trails, Pike National Forest Trails, Waterton Canyon and the Colorado Trail. cpw.state.co.us

Sweetwater Lake State Park

* Sweetwater Lake State Park is the newest on the list as Colorado's 43rd state park. Located in the White River National Forest, between Eagle and Glenwood Springs, Sweetwater Lake used to be the Sweetwater ranch, private land that was sold to the state to help preserve it. Little infrastructure is currently in place for public recreation, with plans for a new boat launch by June 1. cpw.state.co.us

Rifle Falls State Park

Small but mighty, Rifle Falls State Park consists of 48 acres with its central feature a triple 70 foot waterfall flowing into East Rifle Creek. The lush landscape can feel quite different than most of Colorado and is a refreshing reprieve in the middle of Summer. For the daring, explore the nearby limestone caves beneath the falls. Be sure to also check out the nearby Rifle Gap State Park and explore the clean, clear waters of its 350acre reservoir. cpw.state.co.us

Ridgway State Park

🗱 Just north of Ouray, Ridgway State Park is a Summer gem with its beautiful five-mile-long reservoir making staying cool in the Summer easy. The park also boasts nearly 300 campsites for even more Summer fun. Explore the extensive trail system, splash around at the swim beach and take part in almost any sort of water sport with plenty of room to enjoy. cpw.state.co.us

Castlewood Canyon State Park

Often overlooked by its neighbors of Chatfield State Park and Cherry Creek State Park, Castlewood Canyon State Park is the perfect quiet oasis not far from the city. Nestled near the small town of Franktown, just east of Castle Rock, Castlewood Canyon explores Cherry Creek winding through the canyon floor with up to four miles of hiking trails. Plus, discover the historic ruins of the infamous dam that burst in 1933, sending a 15-foot-high wave of water into Denver. cpw.state.co.us

Having just moved to Telluride last year, **BILL ERVIN**, the Assistant House Manager at the Dunton House, is already in love with where he lives. "I love Telluride for the multitude of outdoor activities available just by walking out my front door and the great community of residents keeping the town interesting and close to its roots."

* Ervin says, "Mountain Biking Terrain Park is one of Telluride's newer features to enjoy this Summer." He also says, "the hiking in Telluride is some of the best in the area, with hikes for every ability level." The Cornet Creek Falls Trail is only .5 miles round trip to a stunning waterfall. For a moderate hike, Hike to Blue Lake is a 5.7-mile roundtrip with a 2,000 foot elevation gain and lots of wildflower viewings as well as an alpine lake. For experienced hikers looking to escape the crowds and embrace a challenge, the 6.4 roundtrip Ballard Mountain Hike is a great option.

Ervin also shares something about Telluride most people may not know. "Telluride is actually home to the first alternating current power plant in the entire world situated at the top of Bridal Veil Falls designed by Nicola Tesla to sustain the mining operations that founded the town."







1. Hike to a waterfall

Because of its location inside a box canyon, Telluride is home to several waterfalls, one of which is the tallest in Colorado—Bridal Veil Falls. All are accessible right from town including Bear Creek Falls and Cornet Creek Falls. telluride.com

2. 4x4 Adventure

Bring your own or rent a 4x4 vehicle to explore the nearby mountain passes including Imogene Pass which takes you from Telluride to Ouray. Get your heart racing with incredible mountain views and discover historic mining camps along the way. telluride.com

3. Take a ride in the sky

The free Telluride Gondola runs all year between town and the mountain area offering unforgettable views of the San Juans and canyon floor below. Sunset is a favorite time for travel. telluride.com

4. Telluride Bluegrass Festival

When people think of Summer in Telluride, they think Bluegrass

Festival. The iconic music fest is in its 49th year with no signs of stopping. Bring your own instrument for free workshop and impromptu jam sessions around the festival grounds. June 16-19. bluegrass.com/telluride

KRISTA HEINICKE, the Director of Public Relations for The Broadmoor, has been connected with the hotel since 1984 when she came to Colorado Springs to train for ice dancing at the original Broadmoor World Arena.

Her number one mustdo activity this Summer is the Broadmoor Manitou and Pikes Peak Cog Railway. "Completely rebuilt and reopened in May of 2021, this landmark is the least stressful way to summit America's Mountain."

But she says, "everyone should drive up at least once to get a feel for what race car drivers have experienced since 1915, along the Pikes Peak Highway." This year marks the 100th Running of The Broadmoor Pikes Peak International Hill Climb." Heinicke says. "It's the region's best-kept secret. If you have never been, now is the time!" Also known as the Race to the Clouds, the Hill Climb was America's second-ever auto race. Now it is held on the last Saturday of June every year.

One of her favorite notable nuggets lies at the top of Inspiration Point via Seven Falls where visitors will find the original resting place of Helen Hunt Jackson, author of Ramona and Century of Dishonor.







1. Pikes Peak Cograil

Climb to the top of one of the most iconic peaks in the country aboard the Pikes Peak Railway. Finishing up a three-year, \$100-million refurbishment, visitors can now enjoy the new Pikes Peak Visitor Center and updated rail cars. cograilway.com

2. Manitou Incline

Earn some bragging rights and complete the hike to the top on the Manitou Incline. Gaining 2,000 feet in elevation in under one mile, the climb is fast and guaranteed to raise your heart rate. Reservations are required to complete this extreme hike. Plan for it to take about 30 minutes for the experienced incliners and Olympic athletes or an hour for most hikers. visitcos.com

3. Soak up "The Springs"

Soak it up with the eight naturally-carbonated mineral springs open to the public in Manitou Springs. Take a self-guided tour to see each spring or rest and relax at the SunWater Spa where you can soak in the mineral-enriched waters. manitousprings.org

4. Penrose Heritage Museum

This year, the Penrose Heritage Museum is celebrating its 80th
